The adorable Yorkie pictured here is Miles, one of the 9 dogs PTTR rescued from an overcrowded shelter in Georgia on May 7th. Our friends at Saving Georgia Dogs transported the animals to Greenville, South Carolina, where they were picked up by PTTR pilot in command Robert Fernandez and his co-pawlet Paul Mamauag. Once Robert and Paul returned to New Jersey, the dogs were received by The Second Hand



<u>Dog Rescue, Inc.</u> in Rochester, New York.

Given his heart-melting features, it's no surprise that it took less than two weeks for Miles to be adopted. Also onboard was a Cocker Spaniel named Lewis (pictured below), who is settling into his forever home as well!




PTTR Suffers Oil Leak, Finishes Rescue on Wheels



On May 21st, PTTR Top Dog Michael Schneider flew to southern Kentucky to retrieve 7 dogs from the Knox-Whitley Humane Association. Accompanying Michael on board were co-pawlet Brooke Lima, the founder of buystuffnotdogs.com, and Michelle Young, a veteran of the U.S. Army and celebrated social media influencer (both pictured above).

Shortly after leaving Kentucky, we discovered that our new plane, "Ruff Rider," was **leaking oil** at an alarming rate! We had no choice but to make an emergency landing in rural Kentucky, so far from the nearest town that we had no access to taxis, Uber, or even a rental car service. \Box

Miraculously, we were able to contact the Knox-Whitley Humane Association, which sent us a van so we could




continue our mission on wheels! That's right: Michael, Brooke, and Michelle **drove through the night** all the way to New Jersey, where the dogs were finally received by our longtime partners at Mt. Pleasant Animal Shelter.

Moments like this remind us why we're so lucky to have such selfless volunteers. Even though we were temporarily **stranded in a remote area**, Brooke and Michelle refused to let the emergency landing break their spirits. Their love for animals was simply too great to be deterred by a mechanical mishap and they were happy to keep the dogs calm while Michael drove through multiple U.S. states to reach our destination.

Volunteer Spotlight: Kate Gunderson

This month, we're spotlighting <u>Kate Gunderson</u>, a licensed pilot who helped PTTR Pilot in Command Robert Fernandez and Co-Pawlet Mike Bello rescue 11 dogs from homelessness on May 13th. Fascinated with the stars at a young age, Kate scored her dream job at NASA's Johnson Space Center right after earning a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the Rochester Institute of Technology. As the youngest member of NASA's Flight Science Officer aircrew, she recorded hundreds of flight hours and provided engineering support for over 20 aircraft.



Since 2022, Kate has been attending the National Test Pilot School in Mojave, California on a full-ride fellowship.

She also focuses on harnessing her wealth of aviation experience to help women pursue careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). Cambridge Elementary in NJ Raises 3K for PTTR





Adoption Tip of the Month



Does your dog bark incessantly when someone comes to your door? As naturally protective creatures, dogs instinctively view incoming strangers as intruders, and they bark to notify you of their presence. To teach your dog not to bark every time Amazon delivers a package, you must resist the urge to verbally reprimand them. It's not easy, but you must ignore the barking. If you yell at your dog, they'll think you're joining in on the excitement and will simply continue to bark. Your dog must learn that barking does not elicit a reaction, including opening the door. \Box

Instead, don't open the door until your dog stops barking. You can even turn your back to your dog just to show them that their barking does not elicit any sort of reward. Once your dog goes silent, THEN you can reward their good behavior with their favorite snack and plenty of verbal and physical praise.
