Story Survives Days of Freezing Rain to Find a New Home

Pictured here is the stunning Story, one of the 31 cats we rescued on January 14, 2024 in a collaborative effort with the Wise County Humane Society.

Story is an indoor cat who was suddenly left alone when her owners moved



away, leaving the poor cat on the front doorstep.

Believing her former owners would eventually return, **Story stayed in this same spot and endured several days of rain and frigid temperatures.**

She was eventually discovered by a Wise County Humane Society volunteer who had passed by the house before and noticed Story waiting at the doorstep.

Sensing the cat's fear and physical suffering, this brave volunteer took it upon herself to ask about Story around her neighborhood, which is how she found out Story had been abandoned. She eventually brought Story to safety at the Wise County Humane Society, which coordinated with PTTR to transport Story and 30 other cats to the Wise County Humane Society's rescue partner in New England.

The cats are now awaiting their forever homes thanks to our amazing drivers, Albert and Adrian, who picked up the cats in Virginia and dropped them off to a team of volunteers in Connecticut.

Pixie the Shih Tzu Gets a New Start in Maine

On January 20th, PTTR got word about a young Shih Tzu named Pixie who had just suffered an unfathomable loss. Pixie was pregnant with a litter of puppies but had experienced complications towards the end of her pregnancy. (2)

After performing an emergency C-section, veterinarians revealed that not even one of Pixie's pups had survived. In addition to medical care, Pixie was in dire need of love and support, which her former shelter didn't have the resources to provide.

PTTR sprang into action and harnessed our aviation network to get in touch with a volunteer pilot named Jenna Rouillard. **Jenna flew to Nassau County, Long Island to retrieve Pixie at the <u>Town of Hempstead Animal Shelter</u>. She then flew Pixie back up to Bowdoin, Maine, where <u>The Minnis Sanctuary</u> agreed to adopt Pixie and give her a fur-ever home!**



Volunteer Spotlight: Kyle Morrison



This month, we'd like to shine some light on Kyle Morrison, who has served as a volunteer pilot with PTTR since 2022. Kyle was first introduced to PTTR through his former flight instructor at ATP Flight School in Morristown, New Jersey, where he eventually earned his pilot's license. He and his wife had previously adopted their dog, Oliver, from SXM Paws Animal Rescue during their vacation on the island of St. Maarten. While coordinating the adoption, Kyle consequently became an expert in overseas animal transport just to make sure Oliver made it to his new home safely.


Like a lot of proud pet parents, Kyle has turned <u>Oliver</u> into a celebrated Instagram star with more than 1,400 followers. □

Adoption Tip of the Month



As pet parents, we know dogs love to smell everything, including people they've never met. There's nothing unusual about that: Sniffing is how dogs learn about their environment.

But humans don't follow the same rules as the dog-verse. Aggressive sniffing from a dog they've never met can make human guests and strangers uncomfortable. Don't worry, there's a proven trick for curbing this common habit, sometimes known as "The Palm Method." The idea is to give your dog something else - something more socially acceptable - to sniff.

Here's what to do:

- 1. Rub a treat your dog likes on your hand, so your palm smells extra good.
- 2. Hold your hand out to your dog. As soon as your dog's nose touches your palm, it's time for that good old positive reinforcement. Say "yes!" or "good dog!" and reward your dog with plenty of praise and a treat.
- 3. Repeat steps 1 and 2 until your dog seems to understand that touching their nose to your palm results in a treat.
- 4. Then, do the same thing but without rubbing the treat on your palm. Instead, just say "touch" or "greet" before offering your outstretched palm. Keep repeating this exercise until your dog automatically puts their nose to your palm whenever you say your desired command.


