

11 Dogs Find New Families in Upstate New York

On June 11, PTTR Pilot in Command Robert Fernandez and co-pawlet Angelica Diaz rescued 13 dogs from Western Georgia. The dogs were supplied by the Harrison County Animal Shelter and the Polk County, GA Animal Adoption and Recovery Shelter. Once Robert and Angelica returned to Essex County, New Jersey, the dogs were received by our longtime partners at the Second Hand Dog Rescue, Inc. in Rochester, New York.

Thanks to the Second Hand Dog Rescue's expertise in connecting new rescues with aspiring pet parents, 11 of these paw-ssengers were able to find their forever homes in just a few weeks. This includes the two dogs below, pictured with their new families!


In a collaborative mission with the Toccoa-Stephens County Humane Shelter, the dogs were received by The Second Hand Dog Rescue. Over the following two days, PTTR completed two more missions, including a trip to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, where PTTR Pilot in Command Vikingur Thorsteinsson along with co-pawlet and celebrated magician Doug McKenzie rescued 13 dogs. This mission was made possible by the Everglades Animal Coalition and Compassion Farm, which had originally retrieved the dogs from multiple overcrowded shelters in Florida. The dogs were eventually received by Toby's Dream Dog Rescue in West Haven, Connecticut.

Adoption Tip of the Month



Your dog may love playing outside in the summer sun, but too much play in extreme temperatures can increase the risk of dehydration. If your hometown gets especially hot during the summer, you may want to avoid going for walks or playing outside for extended periods of time during peak sunlight hours. Instead, try to take your dog outside before the sun rises too high in the sky or around when the sun is beginning to set.

To tell if it's too hot to take your dog outside, place your hand on the sidewalk for 7-10 seconds. If you can't keep your hand on the sidewalk for at least 7 seconds, it's probably too hot for a walk or a play session.

Also, if you have a pool and you want your dog to cool off, don't try to force your pet into the water. This is a completely unknown environment for them, so it's crucial to let them go at their own pace. And like virtually any other behavior, you can always entice your dog with treats and praise to help them understand that the water is good for them.

We understand that right now, times are hard, and not everybody can afford to support the organizations they love.


Thankfully, there are still plenty of ways to help PTTR save more lives, and one of them is by creating a nonprofit fundraiser with an Instagram post. □


