Cambridge Elementary Funds an Entire PTTR Mission

On June 9, PTTR Pilot in Command Paul Mamauag and co-pawlet Jason Oliver flew from our home base of Essex County Airport in Fairfield, New Jersey to Greenville, Tennessee, where they rescued an incredible 32 dogs. The animals - which included 30 puppies and 2 adult dogs - were supplied by the Texas branch of Amazing Mutts Puppy Rescue, Inc. and received by Amazing Mutts Puppy Rescue's New Jersey branch.

This massive mission was made possible by the remarkable students at <u>Cambridge Elementary School</u> in Kendall Park, New Jersey. Earlier this year, the Cambridge students collected more than \$3,000 in donations to Cambridge Elementary's "Pennies for Pets" fundraiser.



Below, you can see two of our furry passengers we captured during our flight, waiting patiently to arrive at their destination!






Volunteer Spotlight: Michelle Paolillo

July 4th is a notoriously rough night for our furry friends. Loud noises are a common source of anxiety for dogs, and nothing




triggers this anxiety faster than a firework show. Thankfully, there are a few things you can do to make this **July 4th** much calmer for your dog.

First, take your dog for a nice long walk or bring them to your favorite dog park for a full day of play. Dogs are naturally more relaxed when they have less pent-up energy and will have less trouble sleeping through the night of fireworks.

During the firework show, you can minimize the noise as much as possible by closing the windows, blinds, and curtains, which will also shield your dog from those disturbing flashes of light. You can also play calming music to drown out the loud booms. Every dog has their own taste in music, but soft rock, reggae, and classical seem to be popular choices amongst our canine companions.


PTTR Still Needs Your Help to Quadruple our Animal Cargo


