Two Cane Corsos Get a Second Chance at Life in PA

On November 18th, PTTR volunteer driver <u>Albert Picewicz</u> got behind the wheel of the PTTR Paw-ty van to drive from Essex County, New Jersey to the <u>Town of Hempstead Animal Shelter</u> in Wantagh, New York.

Greeting Albert upon his arrival were two Cane Corsos weighing in at a combined 200 pounds. Albert then headed to Dubois, Pennsylvania, where the two gentle

giants were received by <u>Must Love Corsos Rescue</u>, a rescue organization that specializes in rescuing neglected or abandoned Cane Corsos.

PTTR Rescues a Traumatized New Mom and Her 4 Pups

Just a few days after the previous mission, Albert embarked on another trek to Pennsylvania, this time further South to the state capital of Harrisburg. It was here where Albert picked up 13 dogs in a collaborative mission with the <u>Polk County, GA Animal Adoption and Recovery Shelter</u> and <u>Huckaby's Hope for Paws</u>. Following his return to New Jersey, the dogs were received by our longtime partners at <u>The Second Hand Dog Rescue, Inc.</u> in Rochester, New York.

This mission was particularly important because one of Albert's passengers had suffered severe emotional trauma during her brief stay at an overcrowded shelter in Georgia. Maz, a Husky mix, had given birth to four puppies just one week before she and her pups were surrendered by their previous owner.

If PTTR hadn't intervened, all five dogs would have been euthanized in late November solely because of a lack of space. Below, you can see the heartwrenching fear in poor Maz's eyes right after she was left in this new and unnerving setting.



We are happy to report that Maz is currently doing much better under the care of her foster family. Missions like this are a reminder of why it's so critical to transport these animals to more spacious shelters as quickly as possible. If Maz had spent any more time in an overcrowded shelter, she would have likely developed behavioral issues, which would have made it much harder for her to be adopted.

Ground Transport Spotlight: Albert Picewicz

Adoption Tip of the Month



Regardless of how much your dog loves you and trusts you, moving into a new home with your furry friend can induce tremendous fear and anxiety. Eventually, you're going to have to leave your dog alone when you go out. So, here are a few ways to help your dog prepare to spend time alone in a new home.

Before you go out, take your dog for a nice long walk. This will give your dog a chance to burn off some energy and go to the bathroom, which will make it easier for them to calm down and maybe even take a nap when you're out.

Next, create a calming environment with your dog's preferred comforts. You might consider leaving the TV or the radio on or even placing a belonging that carries your scent in your dog's bed. And of course, make sure your dog has access to water and food (or a savory treat).

Lastly, it's crucial to not make a fuss when you leave or return. Instead, make your exit and return as uneventful as possible so your dog can see that this is a normal occurrence and a regular part of their lives. So, once you've prepared your home for your departure, leave quickly and calmly. You could also use a certain word or phrase (like "see you later" or "be back soon") to help your dog establish a routine and associate this phrase with your inevitable return.


