PILOTS TO THE RESCUE NEWS

Summer may have come an end, but<u>PTTR</u> is still bringing plenty of sunshine and warmth to homeless pets all over the U.S. In the month of September, we rescued more than 50 dogs and more than 30 cats from overcrowded shelters in multiple U.S. states such as Kentucky, West Virginia, and Florida.

We're happy to report that several of these rescues have since been adopted, including a beautiful white puppy who was originally found on the side of a road by an Amazon delivery driver!

PTTR Flies 17 Dogs from Kentucky to New Jersey




Accompanying Mike in the cock pit was <u>Dr. Michaella Abugov</u>, a veterinarian who also happens to be a licensed pilot!

The dogs were supplied by the <u>Knox-</u> <u>Whitley Humane Association</u> and received by our longtime partners at the <u>Mt. Pleasant Animal Shelter</u> in East Hanover, New Jersey.

Our other paw-ssengers for this mission included two litters of newborn puppies. Had PTTR not swooped in, these pups would have likely developed behavioral issues from growing up in a shelter without enough staff and resources to give them proper care. Below, you can see a collage of some of these adorable pups, all of whom will now get the resources they need to grow up in healthier environments.





Also onboard for this mission was Amazon, pictured here. Amazon takes his name from a compassionate Amazon delivery driver who found him wandering on the side of the road in Kentucky. Seeing that the dog was wounded, this anonymous female made the bold decision of pausing her delivery schedule to rescue a defenseless dog from further harm.

We are absolutely delighted to report that thanks to this driver's act of kindness, Amazon has since been adopted by a loving family in New Jersey! It's safe to say we can all learn a lot from Amazon's original rescuer, who clearly understood that every life counts, and that a little compassion can truly make the world a better place.

Adoption Tip of the Month



If you live in a big city, you may notice your neighbors taking their dogs out for errands or dinner on the patio at their favorite restaurant. You may also notice that these dogs are extremely well-behaved and don't seem to be distracted at all by the chaos around them.

If you want to trust your dog to behave while you sip your coffee or chat with your friends in public, step one is to make sure they always respond to basic commands like sit, stay, or down. Dogs that understand these commands are more likely to behave themselves in crowded social settings.

When it comes to extended outings like dinner, you should always be prepared with a leash, blanket, and water. The blanket will give your dog a safe place to relax and stay out of everyone's way. If your dog has never used a blanket, you know what to do: introduce the blanket at home and lead your dog to it with a treat. When your dog sits on the blanket in public, give them a treat so they associate sitting still with rewards. ^(C) The more consistent you are with positive reinforcement, the better your dog will behave in public.

Help Us Reach Our Year-End Goal Towards a New Plane!




